## Reading Like A HISTORIAN

☐ Historians <i>contextualize</i> by asking questions about what was happening in the world at the time the text was written.
☐ Historians see the text as an <i>argument</i> . They read with caution, due to author bias, and challenge the text.
☐ Historians use <b>sourcing</b> to determine what influenced the author's point of view.
☐Historians <i>critique the credibility</i> of the author's argument.
☐Historians carefully consider wording and word choice.
☐Historians <i>corroborate</i> by comparing the text with other sources.
☐Historians <i>synthesize</i> a large number of texts.
☐ Historians <i>evaluate the trustworthiness of multiple sources</i> rather than memorize facts and dates.
☐ Historians wrestle with contradictions in different texts.
☐ Historians <i>infer to develop cause-effect relationships between events</i> by writing down specifics of who, what, when, where, and why.
☐ Historians <i>question explicit connections</i> when they are provided by the author.
☐ Historians pay <i>less attention to graphics</i> than the words in the text.
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
